Drawing on the Cambridge Dictionary definition, a haven is understood as a safe and peaceful place that provides relief from the noise and bustle of city life. They represents micro-interventions, identified as "pictograms" on the strategic 1:10.000 map. This semi-abstract visual language facilitates landscape guidance by nighlighting design strategies that promote a green and just transition, with emphasis on multimodal nubs and integrated green and blue infrastructure. these micro-interventions offer flexible approaches adaptable to other locations along the Magistrale corridor with impactful changes for improvement. Examples include water access points designed for rest and observation, green buffers that mitigate noise while supporting habitats, shared spaces, multimodal hubs, and forest edges enhanced with seating or interpretive signage encouraging quiet



The 'Haven of Memory' in Fussach reconnects a bypassed rural community' with its historical roots and hidden natural features transforming forgotten spaces into places of meaning and recreation. Today, the magistrale bypass cuts the town off from its surroundings and buries a once visible stream in a tunnel, erasing both physical and cultural connections. A proposed shared public space at this intersection reclaims the road's original role not as a traffic conduit, but as a social and civic spine. The buried stream is uncovered and brought back to
